What does the fund invest in?

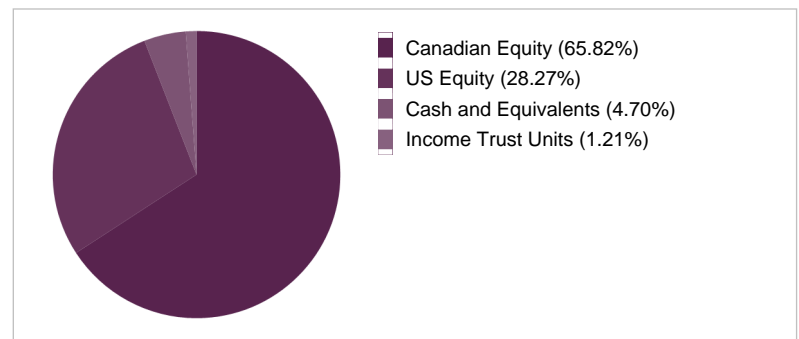
The fund invests primarily in equity securities of large Canadian companies with strong growth potential. Up to 49% of the portfolio may be invested in foreign issuers.

How risky is it?

The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

FAM has rated the volatility of this fund as **medium**.

This rating is based on how much the fund's returns have changed from year to year. It doesn't tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

No guarantees

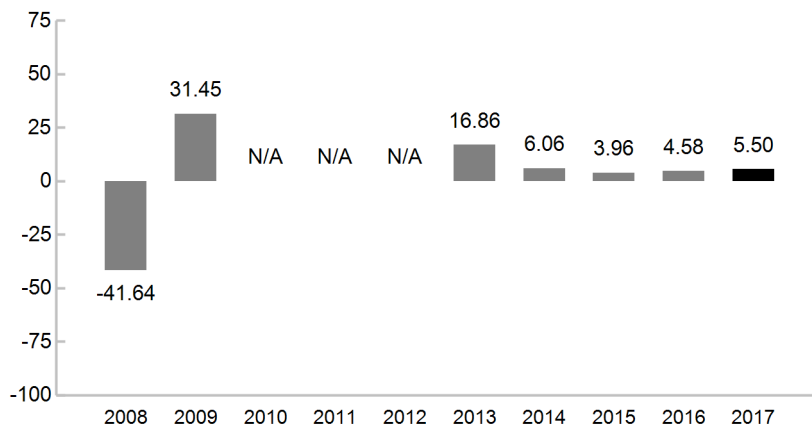
Like most mutual funds, this fund doesn't have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how the Class F units of the fund have performed over the past 10 years. Returns are after the expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the fund's returns.

Year-by-year returns

This chart shows how the Class F units of the fund have performed in each of the past 10 years. The fund dropped in value in 1 of the 10 years. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the fund will perform in the future.



For the purpose of the chart above showing year-by-year returns of the fund, for the period from January 1, 2010 to December 31, 2012, the return of Class A units of the fund was used as a proxy for the return on Class F units of the fund since Class F units were not outstanding for a full calendar year from 2010 to 2012. Class F units were first issued on June 30, 2007 and were fully redeemed on November 22, 2010. Additional Class F units were issued on April 27, 2012.

Best and worst 3-month returns

This table would generally show the best and worst return for the Class F units of the fund in a 3-month period over the past 8 calendar years. However, in determining the best and worst 3-month returns for the period from January 1, 2010 to December 31, 2012, the return of the Class A units of the fund was used as a proxy for the return on Class F units of the fund since Class F units were not outstanding for a full calendar year from 2010 to 2012. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

Average return

The annual compounded return of Class F units of the fund was 5.75% since initial subscription. If you had invested \$1,000 in the fund since initial subscription, your investment would now be worth \$1,392.38.

Who is the fund for?

Investors who:

- are seeking long-term growth potential
- want a Canadian equity fund that focuses on companies with strong growth potential
- are looking for a long term investment
- are comfortable with moderate changes in value during the term

⚠ Don't buy this fund if you have a low tolerance for risk and are seeking to preserve capital.

A word about tax

In general, you'll have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the fund in a registered plan, such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan or a Tax-Free Savings Account.

Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered account, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you get them in cash or have them reinvested.

How much does it cost?

The following shows the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Class F units of the fund.

The fees and expenses – including any commissions – can vary among classes of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about the funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. Sales charges

There is no sales charge on the purchase of Class F Units. Instead, you pay your representative a fee under its wrap account or fee-for-service programs.

2. Fund expenses

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the fund's returns.

As of December 31, 2017, the fund's expenses were 1.56% of its value. This equals \$15.60 for every \$1,000 invested.

	Annual rate (as a % of the fund's value)
Management expense ratio (MER)	
This is the total of the fund's management fee (which includes the trailing commission) and operating expenses. FAM waived some of the fund's expenses. If it had not done so, the MER would have been higher.	1.36%
Trading expense ratio (TER)	
These are the fund's trading costs.	0.20%
Fund expenses	1.56%

More about the trailing commission

There are no trailer fees paid for Class F units.

3. Other fees

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell or switch units of the fund.

Fee	What you pay
Short-term trading fee	2% of the value of units you sell or switch within 90 days of buying them. This fee goes to the fund.
Switch fee	Your representative's firm may charge you up to 2% of the value of units you switch to another imaxxFund.
Class F fee	You may pay fees to your representative to manage the account where the Class F units are held. The amount of the fee is determined between you and your representative, and may be based on the amount of assets in your account.

What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual fund within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus or Fund Facts document, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, annual information form, Fund Facts document or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory.
